Jack L. Beal Selected As Honorary Member of the ASP

In a ceremony which took place at the 25th Annual Meeting of the ASP on August 22, 1984, Dr. Jack L. Beal was presented his honorary membership in the Society by outgoing president Paul L. Schiff, Jr. President Schiff's presentation address is as follows:

"It is a great personal and professional privilege for me to present for Honorary Membership in the American Society of Pharmacognosy, Dr. Jack L. Beal, Professor of Pharmacognosy and Associate Dean, College of Pharmacy, The Ohio State University.

"Dr. Beal was born in Harper, Kansas on July 7, 1923. After attending public schools in Harper and serving as President of his high school student council, he graduated in 1941 and served in the United States Army Medical Corps from 1943 until he was honorably discharged in 1946. He received his B.S. degree in Pharmacy in 1948 from the University of Kansas and his M.S. degree in Pharmacognosy some two years later from the same institution. He received his Ph.D. degree in Pharmacognosy from the Ohio State University in 1952 and remained there as a

faculty member of the College of Pharmacy to rise through the ranks as an Assistant Professor (1952-1957), Associate Professor (1958-1962), and Professor (1963-present). He assumed the additional duties of Assistant Dean in 1978 and soon thereafter became Associate Dean.

"He is deserving of Honorary Membership in the American Society of Pharmacognosy because of his prolific work in the area of pharmacognosy and natural products while serving as a model teacher, scientist and human being for all those around him. His major research interest has been the isolation and structure elucidation of plant metabolites with potential biological activity, particularly alkaloids. In the last 30 years he has published over 100 papers dealing with the isolation and determination of structure of 175 different alkaloids (71 of which were new) from 38 different plants. A number of these compounds were found to exhibit cytotoxic, antitumor, antimicrobial, local anesthetic and hypotensive properties. He is unquestionably one of the leading authorities in the world on the isolation, elucidation of structure, chemisty and biological activity of the Thalictrum alkaloids. In fact, many of the species of Thalictrum he has studied were grown, sometimes quite painstakingly, under his careful direction at the medicinal plant drug gardens at The Ohio State University. He has attracted over \$1,000,000 in grant monies, principally from the National Institutes of Health, in support of his research. He has served as an advisor to 12 Master of Science candidates, 14 Doctor of Philosophy candidates and has been associated with 17 postdoctoral research associates.

"He is a member of many professional societies and organizations and has held numerous honors and distinctions, not the least of which was the recently awarded Research Achievement Award in Natural Products by the Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences. He is a Fellow of the Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences (1971) and has travelled widely as lecturer or visiting scientist both within and outside of the United States. He has held major offices in the American Society of Pharmacognosy (Vice-President and President) and the Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences (Pharmacognosy and Natural Products Section) (Secretary, Vice Chairman, Chairman-Elect, Chairman). He served as a member of the Editorial Advisory Board of Lloydia from 1966-75 and as Editor of The Journal of Natural Products from 1977 thru 1983. Due to his untiring efforts. which were so eloquently summarized by Tip Tyler in his moving presentation last summer, the stature and distribution of the journal continued to grow significantly. He has established himself as a scientist of the highest caliber, with accomplishments achieved by few of his peers. Perhaps some of his greatest features are obvious humility, decency, and team spirit in the midst of such unquestioned success. It has been said that it is not the possession of knowledge nor the possession of irrefutable truths that consitute a man of science, but the dispassionate, incessant search for truth. Jack Beal is a searcher. I am truly proud to present Jack L. Beal for Honorary Membership in the American Society of Pharmacognosy and can think of none more deserving of the same."

PRESIDENT SCHIFF PURGED AT SOCIETY'S AUGUST 22 BANQUET

The Society has a rich history as outlined by Dave Carew. A number of practices and traditions have evolved over the past 25 years. One of the most significant is the annual review of the President's accomplishments and the invocation of lignified vessel elements of *Rhamnus purshianus* in a symbolic catharsis. Norm Farnsworth and I have been charged with the responsibility for maintaining the integrity and objectivity of the evaluation and purging processes.

We have confirmed President Schiff's mastery of controlled pyrolysis of quality *Nicotiana* leaves rolled into a firmly packed cylinder. Records do not go back far enough, however, to reveal the last time Paul bought a box of cigars for either one of us.

ASP BUSINESS

Journal of Natural Products Annual Report

Editor Robbers, Assistant Editors McLaughlin and Kingston, and Managing Editor Stites have done an excellent job in transitioning and transferring the editorial office from Ohio State University to Purdue University. The editorial staff thanks Jack and Earlene Beal for their help during the transition period.

Over the past year the editors were able to decrease the lag time from the date a manuscript was received until it was published. A year ago that lag time was almost a year, and it has now been decreased to about seven months. This was accomplished by increasing the number of pages per issue for several issues.

The editorial staff also opted to decrease the shipping weight of the Journal by decreasing the weight of paper on which it was printed. This was begun with the March-April 1984 issue.

The number of manuscripts remained high in 1983 (260) and is already indicating another record year for 1984 with 200 received as of July 31, 1984.

The Society congratulates the Editorial Staff for a job well done. Keep up the good work!

NEW AWARDS APPROVED

By a concerted effort of the ASP Planning Committee (John P. Rosazza, Chairman, Lynn R. Brady, Geoffrey A. Cordell, and David J. Slatkin, ex officio) and the Awards and Funds Committee (Joseph E. Knapp, Chairman, Robert Krueger, Charles H. Phoebe, Jr., and David J. Slatkin) a package of awards has been presented to and approved by the Executive Committee and the Membership. This package includes five types of awards:

*Travel support for ASP meetings -- up to four awards annually to young investigators. This may require matching funds from the recipient's institution.

*Travel support for graduate students who are presenting papers at the annual meeting -- up to three awards annually.

*Small grant awards for young investigators -- up to two awards annually. These are non-renewable.

*The ASP Research Achievement Award -- this award will be given every three years. The recipient will be asked to give a keynote lecture at the following annual meeting.

*Undergraduate research awards -- up to two awards annually. These awards are for the purpose of interesting qualified undergraduate students in investigating a career in natural products.

You will be informed in future issues of the Newsletter as these awards are placed in effect.

NOMINATIONS

The Nominating Committee (Jack K. Wier, Chairman, Alice M. Clark, and Ronald M. Woodard) presented a slate of nominees to the membership at the annual meeting in Austin:

The ballot for this election will be sent out this fall, and the new officers will be installed at the Annual Meeting in Chapel Hill, North Carolina in 1985.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDEMENTS

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee (Robert Krueger, Chairman, Richard G. Powell, and William J. Kelleher) have proposed a change in the constitution of the Society which will change the position of Treasurer from an elected position to a position of appointment by the Executive Committee. This change is proposed due to the complex nature of the Treasurer's position. The proposed change also defines a five-year term for the treasurer and allows for the appointment of an Assistant Treasurer upon request of the Treasurer. The Assistant Treasurer position could be used as a training experience for a future Treasurer.

This constitutional amendment will be voted on by the membership on the fall ballot.

KILMER PRIZE

The Kilmer Prize for meritorious work in pharmacognosy and natural products is awarded annually by the American Pharmaceutical Association Academy of Pharmaceutical Sciences Section on Medicinal Chemistry and Pharmacognosy. The award is available to both undergraduate students and graduate students in schools or colleges of pharmacy. The prize consists of a gold key, and a \$300.00 honorarium from the American Society of Pharmacognosy. APhA makes available up to \$300.00 for the recipient to attend the APhA Annual Meeting where the award is presented.

ASP NEWSLETTER SURVEY

In Volume 19, Issue 2 of the *ASP Newsletter*, we ran a questionnaire which will aid the scientific and local program committees prepare for the annual meetings. We received responses from 56 members, and the results follow:

Question 1: Length of annual meetings-35% of the respondents chose 3.5 days as the desired length. 88% of the respondents prefer meetings of 3, 3.5, or 4 days in length.

Question 2: Evening sessions--The majority of respondents (70%) would agree to an occasional evening session.

Question 3: Dates of the meetings--The most popular time for a meeting according to our survey is late July (17%). The majority of respondents prefer meetings from late June through early August. (71%)

Question 4: Paper presentations-The majority of respondents (86%) prefer mixed oral and poster presentations as opposed to all oral (11%) or all poster (3%).

Question 5: Number of symposium speakers--The majority of respondents (76%) prefer fewer numbers of symposium speakers (four, six, or eight).

Question 6: Concurrent sessions--This question was by far the most controversial. The majority of respondents (55%) were OPPOSED to concurrent sessions.
