INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS ON NATURAL PRODUCTS RESEARCH

The International Congress on Natural Products Research will be held in Park City, Utah, July 17-21, 1988. The congress is hosted this year by the University of Utah Department of Medicinal Chemistry in Salt Lake City, and is jointly sponsored by the American Society of Pharmacognosy and the Japanese Society of Pharmacognosy.


FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT AT THIS YEAR'S MEETING

A preliminary announcement of the availability of ACPE certified continuing education credit was included in the registration packet mailed to ASP members in late February. As additional information, interested members should be informed that the 12 credits previously announced as available may be increased by attendance at additional hours of podium sessions. The Ad Hoc committee on continuing education is currently cooperating with Mr. William Stilling, Director of C.E. at the college of Pharmacy, University of Utah in developing objectives, etc., in line with ACPE standards, to offer CE credit for each hour of symposium and podium sessions the participant attends. Mr. Stilling has informed the committee that the ACPE will not allow CE credit for attendance at the poster sessions.

Finally, members interested in obtaining CE credit will be required to be registrants at the meeting (as done at past meetings) and an additional nominal fee of \$10.00 will be required to offset the costs of certification. There will be a separate CE table set up at the general registration sites for enrolling in the CE component of the program.

1988 GRANT AND AWARD WINNERS ANNOUNCED

ASP RESEARCH AWARD

The winner of the 1988 American Society of Pharmacognosy Research Award has been announced. This year's winner is Heinz G. Floss from the University of Washington at Seattle. Dr. Floss will receive his award at the annual meeting in Salt Lake City. He will address the participants on the subject of "The Impact of New Methodology on Natural Products Research."

Dr. Floss is the second recipient of the Research Award. The first award was presented to Dr. Koji Nakanishi in July, 1985.

KILMER PRIZE WINNER

Elizabeth R. Trytek, a fourth-year undergraduate student at the Purdue University School of Pharmacy and Pharmacal Sciences, is the 1988 recipient of the Kilmer Prize.

The selection of the award recipient was made by the APhA Academy of Pharmaceutical Research and Science Awards Committee. The award is sponsored jointly by the APhA and the ASP and was awarded at the APhA annual meeting in Atlanta March 12-16, 1988.

NCI ANNOUNCES NEW GUIDELINES FOR SUBMISSION OF EXTRACTS FOR ANTICANCER AND ANTI-AIDS SCREENING

NCI recently announced new guidelines for submission of extracts for anticancer and anti-AIDS screening. Of particular interest to ASP members are the following statements:

"Selection of Samples for Testing

Due to the large number of both natural and synthetic samples generated by various NCI projects, only limited capacity exists for testing of samples supplied by external groups. Preference will be given to extracts obtained from organisms which have a history of medicinal use in the treatment of cancer-related or viral diseases (e.g., plants used in traditional medicine). In addition, consideration will be given to samples having some meaningful biological activity (e.g., activity in a cancer cell line of interest to NCI, antiviral activity, appropriate enzyme inhibition." "Test Capacity

Test capacity is quite limited and it will only be possible to accept highly selected samples. **Do not send samples** until submission is approved by the NCI.

In addition, NCI will not be able to test samples generated during fractionation of active extracts, and it will be necessary for suppliers to follow fractionation using a suitable in-house bioassay. Pure active compounds can be submitted for testing in the full NCI screen."


DR. MILES RECEIVES APPOINT-MENT AT THE UNIVERSITY OF CENTRAL FLORIDA


