## JONATHAN L. HARTWELL 1906-1991

We are saddened to report the death from pneumonia of Jonathan Hartwell in Bethesda, Maryland on March 22, 1991. He was personally responsible for the initiation and early development of the research programs for natural products at the National Cancer Institute and gave impetus to the creation of a systematic search for plants and marine animals with anticancer activity which has been ongoing for over 30 years. His influence in organizing the natural products research programs at the NCI led to the initial and continuing funding of major research groups around the United States including those of pioneers such as Jack Cole, Norman Farnsworth, S. Morris Kupchan, G. Robert Pettit, and Monroe Wall. The discovery and development of a wide variety of structurally and mechanistically diverse compounds by these investigators have provided invaluable tools for many researchers in biochemistry, molecular pharmacology, and medicinal chemistry. 
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## ASP FOUNDATION FORMS

## PELLETIER TO RECEIVE RESEARCH ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

The 1991 recipient of the ASP Research Achievement is S. William Pelletier. Dr. Pelletier was born on July 3, 1924 in Kankakee, Illinois. He is married to the former Leona Jane Bledsoe and the couple has six children.

Dr. Pelletier received his B.S. in Chemical Engineering in June of 1947 from the University of Illinois, graduating Summa Cum Laud. Bill did his graduate work at Cornell University, receiving his Ph.D. in September of 1950 with an Organic Chemistry major and minors in Chemical Engineering and Inorganic Chemistry.

Dr. Pelletier began his professional career as an instructor of Organic Chemistry at the University of Illinois from 1950 to 1951. He then moved on to The Rockefeller University in New York where he started as a Research Assistant in the Department of Chemical Pharmacology, then moved through the ranks to the position of Associate

of the NCI program in demonstrating that plants and animals were indeed useful sources of exciting structural leads led to screening programs in other pharmacological areas, and there would certainly be much less support for plant and marine biomedical research today if not for his trailblazing efforts. His many contributions to Pharmacognosy led to his being chosen as an Honorary Member of the ASP in 1973.

Dr. Hartwell was a native of Boston and studied at Harvard University where he received his bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees in 1927, 1929 and 1935, respectively. After completing his doctoral work, and holding industrial positions at duPont and Interchemical Corp. he was a research fellow in Preventive Medicine and Hygiene at Harvard in 1938 which led to his interest in cancer and carcinogenesis. He joined the National Cancer Institute in 1939 shortly after its formation and served for 36 years until his retirement in 1975. His positions included: Head of the Organic Chemistry Section, Laboratory of Chemistry and Pharmacology; Assistant Chief of the Cancer Products Section, Drug Research and Development Branch; and Chief of the Research Communications Branch. In addition to the ASP, Dr. Hartwell was a member of the American Chemical Society, the Society for Economic Botany, and the Phytochemical Society of North America.

Among his works was the first major compilation of carcinogenic substances.

He did extensive laboratory work at the NCI in the area of lignans, particularly those derived from Podophyllum peltatum and clarified the structures and bioactivities of the peltatins and podophyllotoxins. These studies were the basis for the subsequent discovery of etoposide, now a source of anticancer drug. His interest in plants as a source of anticancer agents led him to compile a very thorough work on traditional and folkloric uses of plants for treatment of cancer which covered references to literature from ancient Chinese, Egyptian, Greek, and Roman eras, the period of European discovery in the Americas and Africa, through to the 1900's. This was originally published in 11 installments in Lloydia during the period of 1967-1971 and has since been reprinted in a single volume named "Plants Used Against Cancer. A Survey". This monumental work incorporates many references to rare original materials.

The word most often used to describe Jonathan Hartwell is "gentleman". He was a gentleman in every sense of the word, and had a reputation for politeness and consideration for others and was always willing to take his own time to teach or help whoever asked him. No task was ever too long or too tedious that he couldn't conquer it by careful organization, patience, persistence, and a dry sense of humor. He never had an enemy, but only many friends, and he will be greatly missed by those who knew him.


#### ASP RESEARCH ACHIEVEMENT AWARD LECTURE

#### Journal Distribution Committee **Requests Donations**

It is a sad commentary that one may visit pharmacognostical colleagues in third world countries who are productive and prolific scientists and realize that they have little access to the Journal of Natural Products, even though they may be valued contributors. Simply put, in many countries the lack of hard currency has put the Journal beyond the reach of people who have a strong need for it. This is a pity for in the long run such a situation is to the detriment of the entire body of pharmacognostical science.

For these reasons, the Journal Distribution Committee has been investigating the requirements for distributing volumes of the Journal to countries which lack sufficient hard currency to acquire the Journal on their own. The Journal is currently printed in runs of approximately 1,800, nearly all of which are distributed to members or other subscribers. The cost of production is just over \$90.00 per volume. The difference between the cost of production and the cost to membership is covered by the higher fees paid by non-member subscribers. The cost of increasing the number of volumes produced is incremental and approximately the same cost as a membership. The Committee is therefore requesting donations of \$50.00 from the membership to allow for the distribution of journals to worthy recipients. While a \$50.00 donation will send a full volume to a single researcher/

library, we also seek partial donations, which we will pool together to donate subscriptions in the name of the Society. Any donation will be fully tax deductible since it will be made through the ASP Foundation. The Committee has compiled a list of potential recipients and seeks long term arrangements wherever possible. The donor of full volumes may suggest the country, and even recipient, to which the volume will be sent. The volume will be inscribed with the donor's name if the donor wishes. The donation of previous complete volumes is also a possibility.
