## David G. I. Kingston named Research Achievement Award

The 1999 ASP Research Achievement Award winner is David G. I. Kingston. Dr. Kingston earned his Ph.D. in Organic Chemistry at Cambridge University in England in 1964. He is currently Professor of Chemistry at Virginia Polytechnic Institute in Blacksburg, Virginia. David has served as Associate Editor of the Journal of Natural Products since 1983 and was President of the Society in 1988-89. This year, he also has the distinction of being the Gene Wise Awardee by the American Chemical Society, Blue Ridge Section.

At Virginia Polytechnic Institute, the Kingston Research Group currently consists of nine members. Their research is centered around the chemistry of biologically active natural products related to cancer. The major areas of interest are the chemistry and mechanism of action of the anticancer agent paclitaxel (Taxol<sup>®</sup>); the isolation and structure elucidation of new natural products with anticancer activity; the use of natural products chemistry to promote biodiversity conservation, economic development and drug discovery in Surinam and Madigascar.

David is a member of the Editorial Advisory Board of Current *Organic Chemistry* published by Elsevier Science Publishing. He has

#### **INTERIM MEETING IN TUNICA** PROVIDED CHALLENGES

"Botanical Dietary Supplements: State of the Science" was the theme of an ASP Interim Meeting hosted by the University of Mississippi at a venue called Tunica. The April 29 - May 1, 1999 conference offered numerous challenges. Certain individuals were challenged when trying to find the venue while driving an automobile, particularly at night. Others were challenged by the lure of gambling at the luxurious casinos of Tunica on the Mississippi. And then there was the challenge of convincing Professor Farnsworth to suit up for his seminar (he was well dressed for his symposium presentation).

The most rewarding challenge was that of participating in the two and one-half day program through learning, debate, and discussion.

The general topic of herbal medicine was indeed timely and it definitely sparked lively, intellectual interaction amongst many of the 200 meeting registrants. The entire meeting was centered around four symposia involving 19 respected scholars and speakers. These symposia sessions were preceded by the keynote address by Dr. Varro E. Tyler, Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Pharmacognosy at Purdue University. Professor Tyler's presentation, entitled "Phytomedicine-Back to the Future," began with a description of the evolution of crude medicinal plant material to present day synthetic drugs. In keeping with the lecture title, Professor Tyler then described how history is apparently reversing itself as millions of people are returning to the herbal medicines that are less expensive, have fewer side effects, and are effective but milder when compared to the synthetic drugs. Professor Tyler continued by focusing on several significant problems that remain to be solved before rational phytotherapy can occupy a meaningful place in our health care system.

The symposia that followed explored the broad categories of herbal product quality assessment, chemical and biological studies of botanicals, and clinical reviews as well as the regulatory issues associated with botanical dietary supplements. All addresses were appropriate, meaningful, well received, and, above all, challenging. The audience was always attentive and interactive. The beckoning casinos and other very tempting recreational activities did not seem to have a serious adverse effect on symposia attendance. Intellectual pursuits apparently triumphed over hedonism in most cases.

An opening reception on Thursday, April 29 was accompanied by a scientific paper poster session. For nearly three hours, meeting participants enjoyed buffet snacks, liquid refreshments, and scientific as well as social camaraderie. Much friendly discussion and debate surrounded the presentation of the poster papers. Although Friday afternoon, April 30, was designated as being free, many meeting registrants continued with scholarly pharmacognostic pursuits and elected to travel by bus to the University of Mississippi campus in order to visit the Thad Cochran National Center for Natural Products Research. The trip was well worth it as participants in this diversion toured a first class research facility.

The Interim Meeting organizers, Alice Clark, Doug Kinghorn, John Cardellina, and Tip Tyler, are to be highly commended for their efforts in offering the Society a meaningful conference experience. Everything was great! The success of the Tunica meeting has prompted discussions of future conferences of a similar nature. We look forward to another intellectual encounter with a scientific herbal medicine program.

**I.** Awards. The main order of business for the Committee this year was to evaluate applications for ASP awards. Applications were received for grants under the program headings:


