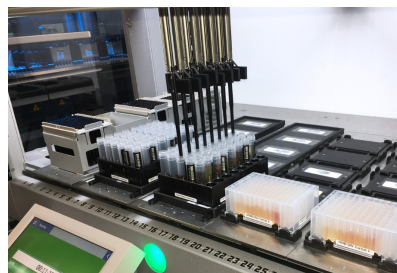
Drug Discoveries from Plant Research

From Friend to Foe: the Story of the Invasive Callery Pear Tree

When: Wednesday, March 8, 7-8 p.m.

First imported from China, the Callery pear became one of the most popular ornamental trees in America. Its seeds were then carried by birds to nearby natural areas, frequently displacing other plant species. Today, an awareness is growing around its environmental impact and increasing number of states are listing the Callery pear as an invasive species. Ohio is the first state to ban its commercial sale and distribution. Dr. Theresa Culley, Head of the Department of Biological Sciences at the University of Cincinnati and member of the Ohio Invasive Plant Advisory Committee, explores the transition from popular garden tree to despised invader. **Registration required.**
