Bridging Continents, Inspiring Action at the Lloyd Library & Museum

Join us as we take you on an unforgettable journey from Madagascar to South Africa—and beyond! Our spring and summer programming celebrates the rich legacy of botanical knowledge and the importance of sustainability.

The Enduring Impact of the African Plant Diaspora exhibition continues through July 25, 2025. Cocurated by Mark Harris, the 2023 Lloyd Library Artist-in-Residence, this thought-provoking exhibit features Harris's original artwork alongside rare 18th-century botanical books from the Lloyd Library's collection. The exhibition sheds light on the often-overlooked contributions of enslaved and indigenous peoples to botanical studies, offering a powerful new perspective on African plant legacies frequently erased by colonial narratives.



BOTANY AND BOTANISTS IN MADAGASCAR: Studying Grasses and Grasslands

Join us as we explore the fascinating world of grasses with **Dr. Maria** (Bat) S. Vorontsova from Kew Gardens, focusing on their incredible diversity of grasses in tropical Africa, especially the lesser-known species and their role in shaping tropical grasslands and savannas. A key project involves creating a detailed guide to the grass family in Madagascar, combining ecology, plant history, and the practical uses of grasses. This program will also touch on the development of plant classification systems and the importance of naming plants correctly.

Dr. Maria (Bat) S. Vorontsova specializes in grasses, with a focus on tropical African diversity, poorly known lineages, and the evolution of grasslands and savannas. Her main research is a taxonomic treatment of Poaceae for the Flora of Madagascar, blending ecological, phylogenetic, and ethnobotanical studies. She also explores plant classifications and nomenclature and manages GrassBase, a global resource compiling taxonomic knowledge on grasses.

Plants that Nourish and Heal: South Africa's Botanical Legacy in the African Diaspora

In this presentation, Dr. Shaik will explore the vital role of South African plants in food security and medicine, focusing, respectively, on undervalued crops and plants used by local communities in primary healthcare. Drawing from her extensive research, she will provide a few case studies and highlight the impact of South Africa's botanical heritage on global agricultural and medicinal practices.

Dr. Shakira Shaik is a Plant Biotechnologist with a Ph.D. from the University of KwaZulu-Natal in South Africa, teaches Plant Biotechnology and Scientific Writing. Her research focuses on stress-tolerant crops and cryopreservation for endangered plants, with collaborations in Brazil and India. She has supervised numerous students, published 30 articles, and serves on editorial boards like the *European Journal of Horticultural Science*. Dr. Shaik is also a grant reviewer and a member of several scientific organizations.
