The Enduring Impact of the African Plant Diaspora Opening Reception

The first of its kind at the Lloyd, *The Enduring Impact of the African Plant Diaspora* is a collaborative exhibition accompanied by a daylong symposium, curated in collaboration with 2023 Lloyd Artist-in-Residence and University of Cincinnati professor Mark Harris.

When: Saturday, April 26, 6-8 p.m.


Where: Lloyd Library

This program will also touch on the development of plant classification systems and the importance of naming plants correctly. **Registration required.**

Lloyd Book Featured in Toledo Exhibit

The Lloyd's copy of pioneering naturalist and artist Maria Sibylla Merian's *Metamorphosis Insectorum Surinamensium* (1705) features in

the Toledo Museum of Art's new exhibition, *Rachel Ruysch: Nature into Art*. The first anthology exhibition of her work, Ruysch (1664-1750) was a Dutch still-life painter a generation younger than Merian, and was inspired by Merian's engraving of a female toad's unique method of reproduction. In addition to dozens of oil paintings, the exhibition highlights the



pictured image from Merian's work alongside other books on the Suriname toad, Ruysch's sketch of the toad, and related specimens.
