Elizabeth Yuko, journalist, bioethicist, and adjunct professor at Fordham University, takes us through the Victorian plant craze, which went beyond decor into the "cult of domesticity." Placing expectations on women to keep family



members healthy and guide them morally, this phenomenon used houseplants to help the Victorian woman accomplish both. Along with the concept of "moral botany" during outreach to working class families, botany also provided an acceptable entry point for women to the sciences. Registration required.
